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SUMMIT OVERVIEW

We are thrilled to once again be partnering with community organizations across the state to produce the Oregon Resilience Summit! The 2024 gathering was rich with connection, reflection, learning and healing. We've heard from a diversity of the inaugural event's attendees: ORS was a unique and productive event generating momentum and fueling community-led initiatives and solutions.

One very consistent message: **"Yes yes yes to another Summit!"**

The inaugural Summit in 2024 was made possible by a diverse group of public, private and philanthropic support. This year, in addition to these same supporters, we are excited to welcome the Office of Governor Tina Kotek to feature the Plan for a Resilient Oregon and celebrate the 50+ community-based organizations who developed this plan in collaboration with state agencies and partners.

BUILDING ON THE INAUGURAL SUMMIT

In 2024, with five co-hosting organizations steering the ship, we brought wildfire survivors, the nonprofits and Community-Based Organizations who serve them, the public sector, philanthropy, businesses and experts together under one roof for a three day Summit in Central Oregon. United by a **shared dedication to a more connected, resilient Oregon**, these groups had "disaster" in common and shared years of experience, frustration, heartbreak, and importantly - *ideas*.





COMMUNITY-LED APPROACH WITH A DUAL FOCUS

The ORS is distinctive in its **community-led approach**, emphasizing the involvement of those directly impacted by disaster and the organizations tirelessly supporting them. ORS elevates community-based organizations by *recognizing them as the experts they are*, and valuing their direct experience and line to those impacted or most vulnerable. By creating a space that prioritizes community voices, we facilitate meaningful conversations, address existing challenges with valuable insider perspective, and celebrate and share the successful initiatives that already exist. **Support will elevate authentic stories of recovery and resilience, platform smaller nonprofits with valuable real world insights, and bring together multi sector partners, survivors, elected officials and others** to inspire a hopeful, healthy, and unified path towards the future.

The dual focus of the Summit, thematically represented as **Reflections** and **Horizons**, provides space to both look back at what we've experienced and the ongoing impacts of disasters, and future-forward, applying what we have learned from the past to inform our resilience, skillshare, and make Oregon more resilient - *together*.

GENERAL THEMES FOR EACH FOCUS

REFLECTIONS

- Debrief recent and past disaster events, such as the Summer wildfires, the 2025 spring and winter floods, and others
- Reflect on challenges and opportunities
- Explore the recovery, rebuilding and healing process
- Review roles of sectors and identify where they do - or could - influence and intersect
- Celebrating wins and insights gained



HORIZONS

- Learn skills and share knowledge with a diversity of resilience champions
- Participate in technical assistance matchmaking - share, receive or both! Network with regional and statewide experts and existing groups
- Explore the latest local, regional and statewide resilience innovations
- Develop, deploy and operationalize tangible tools and programs to strengthen resiliency across populations, sectors, geographic areas and more



The second Oregon Resilience Summit will stay true to the spirit of the inaugural event, bringing all sectors together under one roof to **network and brainstorm** while utilizing the Reflections - Horizons theme to guide session content.



DISASTER ISN'T GOING ANYWHERE - AND NEITHER ARE WE

The urgency of the ORS Summit has been marked by compounding disasters that Oregonians have faced over the past few years, and which has only increased with a volatile 2026 wildfire season well underway. As communities work hard to mitigate and recover from these fires, the Summit will be ready on the other side to host them and elevate their voices in a room with state agency partners, local emergency managers, legislators, philanthropy and many others involved in the disaster lifecycle. Organizers and partners are finalizing thoughtful, engaging event content to connect, reflect, celebrate, grieve, and learn – all in the spirit of fortifying statewide resilience.

"This early season conflagration should come as a reminder to Oregonians to be ready for wildfire," stated State Fire Marshal Mariana Ruiz-Temple. *"The predictions for this summer are extremely concerning."*

Compounding these near-term predictions is the uncertainty of funding for disasters and other emergencies, at both the state and federal level. **There has never been a more important time to come together and build together**, collectively developing solutions and promising models to address and adapt to the certainty of unprecedented disaster in uncertain times.

SESSIONS & SUBJECT MATTER

The following are just a few of the many session topics that community-based organizations have prioritized. A Call for Speakers and a community-based planning committee will support ORS in finalizing content. Last year, over fifty speakers and panelists presented on over twenty different topics, organized around eight different themes within Reflections and Horizons.

ACTIVITIES & OPPORTUNITIES

The inaugural Summit was known for its welcoming, inclusive, diverse and warm atmosphere. The intimate event space and single great hall for sessions meant attendees were on the same journey and exploring topics simultaneously.

We fostered accessibility by choosing a location in central Oregon and offering sponsor-supported stipends to eligible attendees, which could be used for travel, hotel rooms, childcare, to supplement income while away from work, or to lower any other barrier encountered.

OTHER FEATURES OF THE SUMMIT

- A Spanish-language Community Charla exploring stress, with a mindfulness activity
- Daily acknowledgement of ancestral lands and tribal people with song and drums performed by River and Sky Rondeau (Klamath, Modoc, Northern Cheyenne and Apsáalooke)
- Emotional health resource connections (via flyers and handouts)
- A workshop hosted by The Hearth, “The Healing Power of Story”
- The Shaky Grounds Cafe, a hands on "escape room" style game teaching real-life disaster preparedness skills
- A nearby Continued Conversations room for speakers and panelists to continue the discussion after presentations
- Swag which tied into a session exploring everyday items useful in an emergency
- Raffle tickets for each attendee; prizes included gift baskets from Oregon-based and Native-owned companies) and disaster preparedness items (Go bags, water purifiers, etc.)
- Multiple short film or video screenings
- An interactive art piece attendees could contribute to throughout the Summit
- Multi-sector representation, including disaster survivors, legislators, nonprofits, and Tribal, county, state and local government representatives.
